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Introduction

A ward profile has been created for each of the 35 wards in the City of Bristol. These profiles are a collection of the most up to date data from a variety of sources available at a ward level geography. They provide information on key aspects about the ward and how they compare with the rest of the city. This year sees the development of Neighbourhood Partnership areas which are geographically an amalgamation of two or three wards.

Lawrence Hill ward is part of the new Neighbourhood partnership NP08 , which consists of Ashley, Easton and Lawrence Hill

Many of the statistics in this profile come from the annual Quality of Life in your Neighbourhood (QOL) survey. Further information about this survey can be found at www.bristol.gov.uk/qualityoflife.

Citywide there were 8155 respondents in the 2007 survey, 432 in Lawrence Hill.

Because of the relatively small numbers of respondents, care should be taken when looking at the apparent differences between wards.

The following figures for Lawrence Hill compare the QOL respondents' age and gender with that of the revised census mid year estimate for 2006.

While the ward average number of jobs is presented here the majority of wards have around 3,000 jobs. This is demonstrated more clearly in the ranking system where a ward with a below average number of jobs may be highly ranked. This is due to the massive amount of employment concentrated in a few city centre wards e.g. Cabot.

Economically inactive includes students, retired people, permanently sick or disabled etc.

4. Poverty and Deprivation Profile for Lawrence Hill

Wards in Bristol are relatively large in terms of population and many contain a wide variety of neighbourhoods. This local variation is often lost when information is collated into ward averages. An alternative geography based on smaller areas - Super Output Areas (SOAs) - seeks to address this (see map opposite). Bristol has been divided into 252 SOAs, each with an average of 1,500 people. The most recent data available by this geography are the Department of Communities and Local Government (DCLG) Indices of Deprivation 2007, illustrated here.

The Indices of Deprivation 2007 consist of 7 aspects or 'domains' of deprivation: Income deprivation (I); Employment deprivation (E); Health deprivation and disability (H); Education, skills and training deprivation (S); Barriers to housing and services (B); Living environment deprivation (L); and Crime (C).

There are two supplementary Indices - the Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index (K) and the Income Deprivation Affecting Older People Index (O)

These domains are combined to give an overall measure of Multiple Deprivation which is then ranked in order to make comparisons with other areas.

Lawrence Hill is the most deprived ward in Bristol with Easton Road SOA ranking the worst in Bristol overall and income deprivation.

Old Market and the Dings' is the SOA with the rank worst in Bristol overall and for Employment Deprivation, (313th nationally) and second worst for Health Deprivation & Disability (385th nationally).

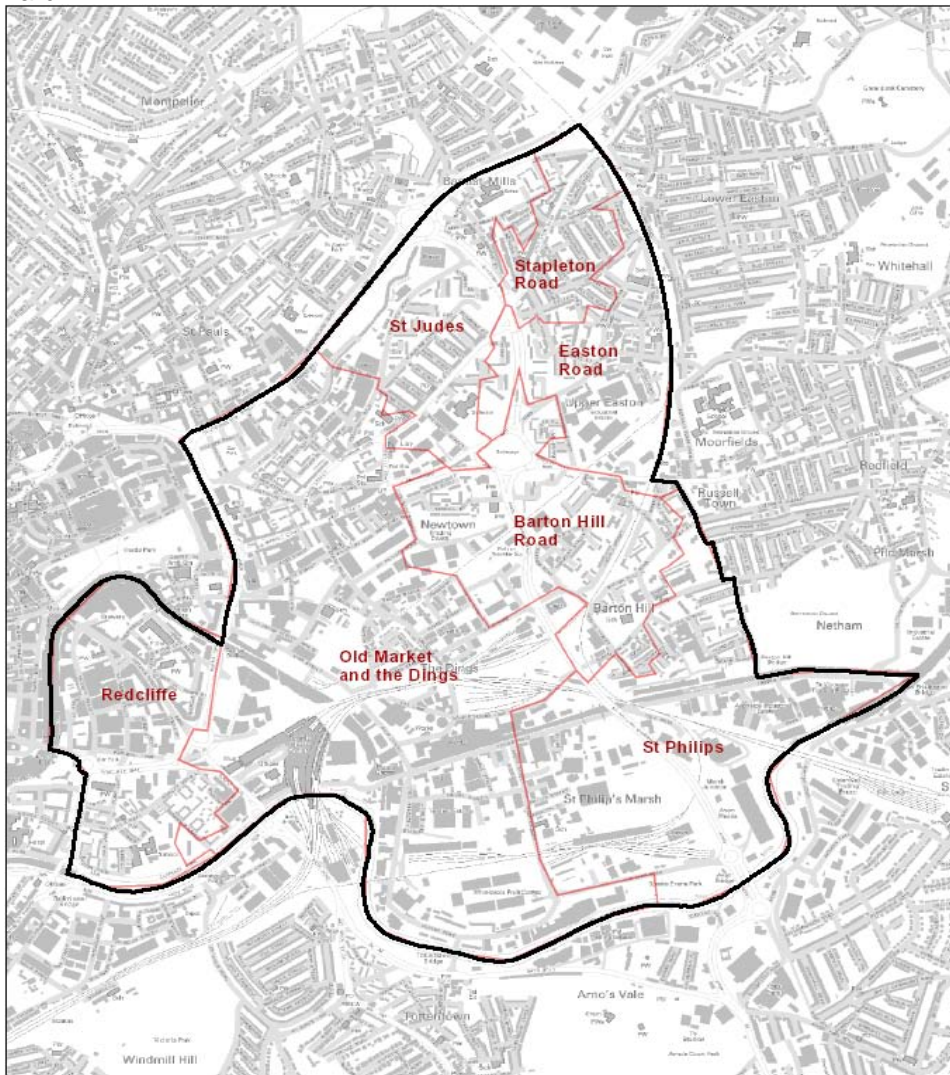

SUPER OUTPUT AREAS

Wards in Bristol are relatively large in terms of population and many contain a wide variety of neighbourhoods. This local variation is often lost when information is collated into ward averages. A new geography based on smaller areas - Lower Layer Super Output Areas (LSOA's) - seeks to address this.









Bristol has been divided into 252 LSOA's, with an average of 1,500 people. The map below shows the LSOAs in this ward:



6. Local Environmental Quality in Lawrence Hill

The nitrogen dioxide figure is taken from a single site with a passive NO₂ diffusion tube located in a background location in each ward. Although the single site cannot represent the whole of the ward this survey has been continuing for many years so good trend information can be obtained. Most sites are below the national objective of 40 µg/m³ as an annual average.

A liveability indicator has been developed to monitor progress of a range of initiatives in Bristol including Neighbourhood Renewal. The indicator takes into account the cleanliness and attractiveness of the local environment as reported by residents in the annual **Quality of Life in your Neighbourhood** survey. A higher figure indicates better liveability.

7. Housing profile for Lawrence Hill

By affordable dwellings we refer to dwellings owned by registered social landlords and local authorities, either for rent or for shared ownership. Private dwellings are not included as 'affordability' has yet to be adequately defined for this sector. Please note that the 'affordable dwelling' numbers are decreasing in some wards through losses in local authority stocks. Average house prices, (courtesy of the Land Registry and Bristol City Council's Strategic & Citywide and Regeneration, Research & Evaluation Teams), are a rough guide only as both the number of sales and the housing profile (see Tenure below) vary throughout the city.

8. Health profile for Lawrence Hill

Some of the indicators from the Primary Care Trusts are shown as standard mortality ratios (SMR). This measure provides a way of comparing death rates across different areas with the old Avon area (Bristol, South Gloucestershire, North Somerset and Bath and North East Somerset) standard set at 100. SMRs higher than 100 are of concern.
