I am writing to inform you that the Lawrence Weston Neighbourhood Development Plan has been formally submitted to Bristol City Council by the Lawrence Weston Neighbourhood Planning Group and to invite you to make comments on the document on behalf of the council.

Neighbourhood Development Plans are planning policy documents prepared by local communities. Before the Lawrence Weston Neighbourhood Development Plan can become a statutory planning document, it must be published for consultation and passed to an independent examiner for

scrutiny. If successful at examination, the Neighbourhood Development Plan will proceed to a local referendum to decide whether it should become part of the development plan for Bristol and be used alongside the Bristol Local Plan to determine planning applications in Lawrence Weston.

The local community and stakeholders have already been involved in the preparation of the plan, but there is now a further opportunity for you to comment and have your views passed to the examiner for consideration. **Representations can be made for a six-week period from Friday 6th May 2016 to Friday 17th June 2016.** Please be aware that all representations will be publicly available.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Lawrence Weston Neighbourhood Development Plan and Design Statement

It is clear from the plan that the Local Community and Neighborhood Planning Group have considered the needs of the local community in writing the plan and have identified a number of excellent opportunities for the benefit of the community, which is to be commended.

We would endorse the communities’ aspirations for Health. However the document also suggests a number of solutions, which are still being explored and have not yet been agreed. We therefore request the proposed detailed solutions proposed in the plan are amended to reflect this as follows:
