TITLE We're having a party ...

KEY CONCEPTS

- Recognising that healthy lifestyles, and the wellbeing of self and others, depend on information and making responsible choices
- ◆ Understanding risk in both positive and negative terms and understanding that individuals need to manage risk to themselves and others in a range of situations
- Appreciating that pressure can be used positively or negatively to influence others in situations involving risk

KEY PROCESSES

- Reflect on feelings and identify positive ways of understanding, managing and expressing strong emotions and challenging behaviour
- ◆ Develop self-awareness by reflecting critically on their behaviour and its impact on others.

KEY CONTENT

- Facts and laws about drug, alcohol and tobacco misuse, and the personal and social consequences of misuse for themselves and others.
- Understand ways of recognising and reducing risk, minimising harm and getting help in emergency and risky situations.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

by the end of the lesson pupils will be able to:

- Explore some of the risks involved around alcohol and illegal drugs in a party situation
- Discuss some strategies for handling potential risky situations

LESSON PLAN

Activity 1

- Play a game of consequences in groups involving drugs and young people
- Every pupil starts off with a sheet of paper...they write down their answer fold the sheet over and then pass it on. Repeat this for every question.
- It is a good idea to remind pupils of the ground rules to ensure their responses are appropriate.

- Ask the pupils to open up their sheets and read the different responses and then ask each pupil to decide"What the consequences were"....
- Share answers with whole class.

- Discuss the possible outcomes from the first picture. Now draw your own story of what happened next
