It awarded sufficient funds we would also install urinals in the men's to increase capacity.	£6,000.00
Brislington East	Improvements to Woodcroft Community Orchard	Woodcroft Community Orchard	We wish to commission a qualified carpenter to design and construct a range of features within the orchard, including: - a nature sculpture trail featuring wooden carvings of the animals and birds that inhabit the orchard; - a fairy door trail, with each door displaying the name of the corresponding tree; - a treehouse, making use of an existing tree within the orchard; and -a standalone bug hotel. These features will support schools and community groups that use the orchard by enhancing opportunities for outdoor learning. They will encourage engagement with local wildlife and tree species, while also promoting exploration, natural play, and a deeper connection with the outdoor environment.	£5,000.00

The pond will require minimal maintenance and play a central role in the park's ecosystem. Bristol City Council officers can help develop a detailed, safe, and sustainable plan.	£55,000.00
Brislington West	Improvements to local road safety- Sandy Park Rd	Individual resident	Parking and speeding are issues locally to Sandy Park Road. Individuals regularly park on double yellows creating unsafe junctions with limited sight lines around Rugby Road and Winchester and Wick Roads. 2 small planter boxes would prevent unauthorised parking, while retaining visibility of the junction. They would also add greenery and biodiversity to an area in much need of soft landscaping. Examples on Lyndale Rd and Lake View Road around St George's Park have been successful in this regard.	£1,100.00
Brislington West	Resurfacing of footpaths in Natural Burial Woodland at Arnos Vale Cemetery	Arnos Vale Cemetery Trust	Resurfacing a 165m path used by local community, visitors, funeral workers and families of deceased to create a long-lasting, safe surface for users. The hoggin path in the south east of the cemetery which weaves through the Natural Burial Woodland has eroded, creating uneven and slippery stretches, that are deteriorating quickly. We propose re-surfacing the path with a more resilient and long-lasting surface, giving cemetery users a safer, less treacherous area to walk in.	£13,000.00
Knowle	Pedestrian crossing on Redcatch Road at Stoneleigh Road junction	Individual resident	A lot of children cross Redcatch Road at the Stoneleigh Road/Tennis Road/Calcott Road junction, to get the Knowle Park Primary School. In year 6 many walk to school alone. Crossing at this junction is very dangerous due to cars driving at high speeds, a lot of parked cars blocking the view and a blind corner. There's no pedestrian crossing anywhere on this stretch of road and the geometry of the roads facilitates high speeds and a lack of safe space for pedestrians. Tightening up the junctions and adding a pedestrian crossing would make a huge difference to children's safety at this location. A crossing with a green man would be safest. Adults in the local community, particularly those with mobility issues or sight problems, would also benefit. This would be in line with the Healthy Streets approach	
Knowle	Improvement to main hall of community centre- Knowle District community association	Knowle and District Community Association	The hall would be updated by the walls being clad internally to help with the heating, and painted to overcome the problem of the paint peeling off the walls at the moment.	£4,000.00

Knowle	Fit-out of two community buildings to improve local residents' access and use of green space for nature, growing, and social infrastructure.	We Are More	<p>Our proposal is to fit-out two “community huts” in a community-run growing space – Springfield Allotments. The huts will create year-round infrastructure to support local people to access a vibrant community allotment in an area of high disadvantage. They will learn nature and food growing skills, and access social connection and support. The huts are made from biomaterials and use natural building techniques The fit-out of the huts includes workshops to teach local people natural building skills including working with clay, timber, and biodiverse planting.</p> <p>This will create much needed additional nature and social space and infrastructure in our community, helping to ease the pressures of additional development taking place in our area.</p>	£17,500.00

Knowle	Traffic calming on Ilminster Avenue	Ilminster Avenue PTFA	<p>Ilminster Avenue PTFA proposes a zebra crossing outside the school and nursery to reduce speeding by cars and cyclists. This clear visual measure would calm traffic, improve safety, and support the amazing lollipop lady by reinforcing safe crossing behaviour, especially during busy drop-off and pick-up times.</p>	
Knowle	Improvements to Sylvia/St Agnes/Ravenhill Avenue road infrastructure.	Individual resident	<p>Road safety concerns due to rat-running, speeding, dangerous vehicle junctions heavily used by cyclists, pedestrians (commuters, park users & school children). Large vehicles avoiding congestion and CAZ. Kerb edgings destroyed by vehicles mounting them to manoeuvre, 4-point junction no accessible crossing points for mobility needs, prams etc. Road signs broken, inadequate, missing.</p> <p>Deliver a package of highway safety and accessibility improvements on Sylvia Avenue, St Agnes Avenue and Ravenhill Avenue, including new dropped kerbs and crossings, junction improvements, Access changes to remove through traffic, reduce rat running and motorbike access, improved signage, and parking controls. The scheme will be designed and delivered by Bristol City Council on the public highway.</p>	£150,000.00

Knowle	Accessible Pathway for Inclusive Community Green Space	Redcatch Community Garden	<p>Redcatch Community Garden currently has limited accessibility for wheelchair users and those with mobility challenges, restricting their ability to fully engage with nature-based wellbeing activities. We aim to create more accessible ground and pathways to ensure that everyone, regardless of mobility, can benefit from our green space and community offerings.</p> <p>We propose installing more accessible ground and pathway to improve wheelchair and mobility access throughout Redcatch Community Garden. This will enable inclusive participation in our wellbeing, education, and community programmes, ensuring that everyone, regardless of physical ability, can connect with nature and benefit from our green space.</p>	£25,000.00
Knowle	Make Community Room Accessible	Totterdown Baptist Church	<p>The Salt Cellar is a well-used community space but is not fully accessible. Four steep internal steps prevent wheelchair users, people with mobility needs, older residents, and parents with pushchairs from entering. This excludes some local people entirely and means an important community space in Knowle Ward is currently under-used. The proposal is to install a permanent internal ramp from the entrance level into the Salt Cellar hall. This would make the space fully accessible for wheelchair users, people with mobility needs, older residents and families with pushchairs, and enable wider community use of an existing and well-used local community facility.</p>	£20,000.00
Knowle	improve access for more people to get to the Bommie Open Space to and from Daventry Road.	Northern Slopes Initiative	<p>The Bommie is an informal green space located in South Bristol. This proposal is aiming to improve the access for people to the Bommie at the entrance near St Barnabas Church. To improve access for more people to get to the Bommie Open Space to and from Daventry Road. To replace the existing kissing gate with a larger version of the same.</p>	
Knowle	Roof repairs to church	South Bristol Methodist Church - Knowle	<p>Wear-and-tear damage to the roof is causing water ingress leading to damp walls and increasing damage to this Grade II listed building. This is causing safety issues with the risk that part of the roof will collapse or that tiles will fall from the roof and hit pedestrians. Repair to the roof including preparatory work for the installation of solar panels.</p>	£20,000.00
Knowle	Improvements to path from Beckington Road area to the Bommie.	Northern Slopes Initiative	<p>To reprofile existing unsafe slope and create new path in the Beckington Road area of the Bommie. See attached document. In the document these are shown as B to C, and C to D.</p>	
Knowle	Improvements to Public Footpath from Beckington Road to the Bommie	Northern Slopes Initiative	<p>To fill in holes in existing path from Beckington Road; and then reprofile steps down to the Bommie. See attached document.</p>

Stockwood	upgrade for wheelchair access at Whitecross Avenue / Davids Road to Whitchurch Way Cycle Path	Cllr Johnathan Hucker; Bruce Banfield	Currently there is no wheelchair / pushchair access on the west side of Whitchurch Way Cycle Path between Manston Close entry/exit point and the Staunton Lane, Whitchurch entry/exit point. Cycles have to be carried up and down the steps to reach the cycle path at the Whitecross Avenue / Davids Road access point. Every single access from the east side of the cycle path can all be accessed by wheelchairs, but none at all on the west side. 1. The Witheys, in Whitchurch currently obstructed by restricted swing gate entry. 2. Wells Road between Dene Road and Saltwell Avenue restricted by narrow steep steps. 3. North side of Saltwell Viaduct restricted by steps to the footbridge and steepness of the incline. 4. Whitecross Avenue / Davids Road access restricted by steps 5. Adjacent to 129 Hazelbury Road, restricted by locked gate.	£50,000.00
