Electoral registration actions undertaken are uniform across Bristol— ie every property is communicated with four times ie three forms and a house visit. Any free publicity is targeted where possible to lower-responding wards.

National studies – eg Electoral Commission 'Accuracy and Completeness of the Electoral Register 2016' - show that the strongest characteristics that result in underrepresentation are:

- Age (the young). The younger the person (attainers and those of voting age), the less likely they are to be on the register.
- Transient populations (those who have moved within 3 months).

Other impacts are tenure of property – tenants are less likely to be represented. However local research has not been undertaken.

Electoral register information does not include protected characteristics.

Any potential drop-off in response levels is expected to be overcome by enforcing that canvassers only visit at optimal times of the day for their area and that a higher rate of pay is maintained for obtaining details of occupants.

People who do not respond to the canvass have further opportunities every month to be included later.
