INFANT CLASS SIZE - Government legislation means that infant classes (Reception, Year 1 and Year 2) with one teacher cannot contain more than 30 pupils. When considering an appeal for a place in an infant class the independent appeal panel's task is to review the decision already made. It does not have the flexibility to say that the appellant's personal circumstances mean that they should have a place at the school if this would take the number of children in the school class over 30. This makes an infant class size appeal different to other school admission appeals.

ALLOCATION STATEMENT FOR ADMISSION TO RECEPTION 2015/16

Cathedral Primary School (CPS) is a Free School run independently from the Local Authority (LA) and is funded directly by the Department for Education (DfE) for a set number of places in each year group. This is called the Published Admission Number or PAN. The PAN for Reception 2015/16 entry is 30. However, even though the PAN remains unchanged the Governors have agreed to a temporary breach of the PAN not to exceed 45 places for the 2015/16 academic year. This temporary breach was agreed as the building plans have not yet been finalised for the new site for the primary school. Exceeding more than 45 places would place enormous constraints on the existing school site with health and safety issues the main concern for pupils and staff.

CPS is part of the Coordinated Admissions Scheme with Bristol City Council (BCC).

The reason why your child was not successful in gaining a place at the primary school:

CPS has received 237 on-time applications for the 45 places available and is therefore unable to offer places to every applicant who applied.

All 45 places have been allocated by applying the published oversubscription criteria, **in order**, as set out in the Admission Arrangements 2015/16 for the 1st round of allocation:

- Highest priority was given to children who were defined as Looked after Children or Previously Looked after Children (2 places).
- Children with siblings of Statutory School Age attending CPS or BCCS who will still be on roll in September 2015. (11 places).
- Children who have a Medical & Social Need that only CPS can meet (0 places).
- Children who are sons/daughters of staff employed by CPS (0 places).
- The remaining 32 places were allocated randomly and supervised by an independent person.

CPS is its own admission authority and maintains its own waiting list. Applicants not allocated a place in the 1st round of the process were placed onto the waiting list by random allocation. Any places offered in the 1st round that are declined by parent/carers, will be re-offered from the waiting list, using a fresh round of allocation and supervised by an independent person.

HOW CAN I APPEAL?

Firstly complete Section B of the Response Form included with the letter of refusal and return it within 14 days of the date of the letter.

Your reasons for appealing (your 'Appeal Statement') **must** be made in writing and you may use the Appeal Statement sheet already provided, your own paper or send it via email to: admissions@n-somerset.gov.uk by the date for the return of appeals stated in the letter of refusal.

You will receive at least 10 school days notice of the date and venue of the appeal hearing and more detailed information about the appeal process.

WHAT ARE INFANT CLASS SIZE APPEALS?

The School Standards and Framework Act 1998 states that, subject to certain limited exceptions, no infant class with a single qualified teacher may contain more than 30 pupils. In such circumstances an admitting authority must normally refuse to admit a child to a school because the admission would require what's known as 'Relevant Measures' to be taken by the school to comply with the class size limits, which would cause prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources. Relevant measures would include, for example, employing an additional teacher.

The Appeal Panel may only allow an Infant Class Size Appeal where:

A – it finds that the admission of additional children would not breach the infant class size limit;

This looks at whether the infant class size limit of 30 children with a single qualified teacher would in fact be exceeded if your child was admitted. It does not mean that your appeal would automatically be allowed as the Panel would also consider whether prejudice would arise in the future (Years 1 & 2) if your child was admitted.

B – it finds that the admission arrangements did not comply with admissions law or were not correctly and impartially applied and the child would have been offered a place if the arrangements had complied with admissions law or had been correctly and impartially applied; or

This looks at whether the admitting authority's admission arrangements met the mandatory provisions of the School Admissions Code and the School Standards and Frameworks Act 1998 and other legislation. If arrangements did not follow legal requirements, then your appeal may succeed – but only if your child would have got a place at the school if the law had been applied properly.

C- it decides that the decision to refuse admission was not one which a reasonable admission authority would have made in the circumstances of the case.

This looks at whether the admitting authority acted unreasonably. The law defines “unreasonable” very carefully. The decision to refuse a place must not be irrational or perverse given the circumstances of the case. To determine what was “unreasonable”, the Panel will need to be satisfied that the decision was “perverse in the light of the admission arrangements”. Put more simply, the decision must appear illogical, irrational or wildly ridiculous when looking at the facts of the case.

When considering A, B or C, the Panel will review the decision made by the admitting authority. Normally it will only consider the information and material available to the admitting authority at the time the decision was made to refuse a place at the school, or information that would have been available if the admitting authority had acted reasonably. The panel may allow you to submit fresh information so you can show the basis for your claim that the class size limit would not be exceeded if your child was admitted **(A)**, or that the admission arrangements had not been properly implemented and that they were not lawful **(B)** or to show what your circumstances were at the time the decision was made in order to support your claim that no reasonable authority would have made that decision **(C)**.

The Allocation Sheet (enclosed with your letter of refusal) will indicate if appeals for the school are Infant Class Size Appeals by stating “*Any appeals for places at the school are therefore 'infant class size prejudice cases'.*”

ARE THERE OTHER TYPES OF APPEALS?

Yes. Whilst the majority of appeals are ‘Infant Class Size’ hearings not all appeals are of this type. Where schools have less than 30 pupils in a class (in Reception and future infant year groups) the appeal hearing will be different from described above. In such cases the panel will consider whether ‘prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources’ would arise if the child was admitted - but it does not consider if ‘Relevant Measures’ would need to be taken by the school. The panel will also consider if the admission arrangements comply with the admissions law, whether they were correctly applied and, if not, whether this led to your child being refused admission.

The panel will take into account the reasons you have given for your preference and will balance the case presented by the admissions authority against your case. If they feel that the reasons you have put forward outweigh the Admission Authority case they will offer you a place at your preferred school.

The Allocation Sheet (enclosed with your letter of refusal) will indicate if appeals for the school are of this type by stating “*To admit another child to the school would cause prejudice to the provision efficient education or the efficient use of resources.*”

DO I NEED TO ATTEND THE APPEAL HEARING?

No but you are strongly encouraged to attend the hearing to present your case. It gives you the chance to explain why you want a place at the school and to ask questions. The appeal panel can talk to you and get a clear understanding of your case. You are welcome to bring a friend or relative to support you or speak on your behalf. If you are unable to attend in person, someone else may present the case for

you. If you decide not to attend the hearing a decision will be reached based on your written statement.

WHO ARE THE APPEAL PANEL MEMBERS?

The panel is independent of the school and the Local Authority. In North Somerset, panels usually have three members. The panel must include at least one lay member i.e. someone without personal experience in the management of a school or the provision of education in a school (disregarding experience as a school governor or in another voluntary capacity). The panel must also include at least one person who has experience in education, or is a parent of registered pupils at a school. Although panel members may be school governors or teachers, they will not be a governor or teacher at the school in question. They will not represent the interests of your preferred school or the Local Authority.

WHAT HAPPENS AT THE APPEAL HEARING?

The admission authority will present their case and you will be able to present your case. You may ask questions of each other and the appeal panel may also ask questions of both the admission authority and parents.

WHAT HAPPENS IF OTHER PARENTS ARE APPEALING FOR THE SAME SCHOOL AS I AM?

Then the panel will hear all appeals for that school before reaching any decision. The appeal panel will **not** deal with the appeals as individual appeals, but will deal with such appeals as 'grouped multiple appeals'. In these hearings the Admission Authority's case is heard once in the presence of all or groups of parents (and any representatives). The Admission Authority representative may be accompanied by someone from the school. Parents (and representatives) and the Panel may ask questions about the case. If the panel concludes that 'prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the use of resources' exists and/or the school would have to take 'Relevant Measures' if applicable (see above), it will be necessary to move to the next stage of the hearing (although that may be on a different date). At this stage, the appeals of the individual parents will be heard without the presence of the other parents.

WHEN WILL I KNOW THE RESULT OF MY APPEAL?

It is normally possible for parents to telephone the Clerk/Solicitor within 24 hours of the last hearing to be told the decision. The Clerk/Solicitor will also notify you of the panel's decision in writing – usually within 7 days.

If your appeal is allowed, the decision is binding on the admitting authority, and the school, and your son/daughter must be admitted to the school.

An Independent Appeal Panel for an infant class size appeal can only consider –

1. Whether the admission of an additional child / additional children would breach the infant class size limit;
2. The lawfulness of the admissions arrangements: The admission arrangements must comply with the mandatory requirements of the School Admissions Code and Part 3 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998;
3. Whether a mistake was made in administering the Admission Authority's published admissions criteria, which resulted in not offering your child a place;
4. If it was unreasonable or perverse in a **legal sense** to refuse a place at the school. See overleaf for further clarification.

What does infant class size prejudice mean?

Regulations made under the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 (implemented from September 2001) limit the size of an infant class (a class in which the majority of children will reach the age of 5, 6 or 7 during the school year) to 30 pupils per qualified class teacher. Only in very limited circumstances can admission over the limit be permitted.

Following the introduction of class size limits the Local Authority does not have to meet parental preference if this would mean having to take '**relevant measures**'. Relevant measures may include employing an additional teacher, building an extra classroom or a reorganisation of classes.

The legislation also applies where these steps would be necessary in future years. For example, a school may organise with two or three small reception classes and mixed Year 1 and Year 2 classes; the mixed classes each containing 30 children. If an additional child was admitted into the reception group, over the admission number, relevant measures would be required in a year's time when the reception group becomes Year 1 and is mixed with children from Year 2 into groups of 30 children.

What does 'reasonable' mean in the context of Infant Class Size Appeals?

Paragraph 4.10 of the School Admission Appeals Code which came into force 1 February 2012, states –

The threshold for finding that an admission authority's decision to refuse admission was not one that a reasonable authority would have made is high. The panel will need to be satisfied that the decision to refuse to admit the child was 'perverse in the light of the admission arrangements'. Is it was 'beyond the range of responses open to a reasonable decision maker' or 'a decision which is so outrageous in its defiance of logic or of accepted moral standards that no sensible person who had applied his / her mind to the question could have arrived at it'.

Am I still able to appeal for my preferred school(s)?

Yes – parents / carers of a child that has been refused admission to a school may exercise their right of appeal. Parents will be given the opportunity to appear in person and speak at the hearing. However, because it is an Infant Class Size appeal the panel is only able to consider the very limited circumstances as outlined over the page.

If I decide not to appeal can I remain on a waiting list for my preferred school(s)?

Yes. The waiting lists will be maintained until the end of Term 2 (December).

If an infant class has a full-time general assistant or nursery nurse, in addition to the full-time qualified teacher, does this mean that the class can take more than 30 children?

No – the law states that within a normal admissions round no infant class with a single qualified teacher may contain more than 30 children unless the admission authority or the independent admission appeal panel accept that an error was made in implementing the published admissions criteria.

- Whether it was unreasonable/perverse (in law) to refuse your preference. The appeal panel would need to be satisfied that the decision was so completely absurd / outrageous that no reasonable person, with the same facts, would have made that decision.

Given the extremely limited grounds on which an appeal may be upheld, Infant Class Size Appeals are rarely successful. Since the legislation was introduced from September 2001, only 1 such appeal has been successful within South Gloucestershire.

Parents/carers can find it frustrating when they realise how very limited the powers of the Appeal Panel are. We are therefore drawing this to your attention now, so you can make an informed choice about whether you wish to appeal or not. The purpose of this information is to explain clearly the role of the Appeal Panel and not in any way discourage you from appealing, which is of course, your legal right if you feel you have grounds to do so.

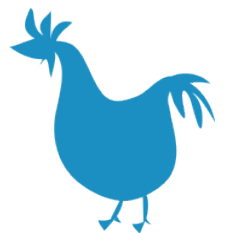

Infant Class Size Appeals

"In order for a panel to determine that an admission authority's decision to refuse admission was unreasonable, it will need to be satisfied that the decision to refuse to admit that particular child was 'perverse in the light of the admission arrangements', i.e. it was 'beyond the range of responses open to a reasonable decision maker' or 'a decision which is so outrageous in its defiance of logic or of accepted moral standards that no sensible person who had applied his mind to the question could have arrived at it'.
