

# Transfer to Primary School - September 2019 Allocation Sheet for Ashcombe Primary School



#### National Offer Day (16 April 2019)

Ashcombe Primary School has an admission number of 90.

174 preferences have been received for the school. It has, therefore been necessary to use the oversubscription criteria, as outlined below, to determine which of the applicants should be offered the places available.

The 90 available places have been offered to the following applicants:

The distance between home and school for the last child offered a place was 1.062 miles.

To admit another child to the school would cause prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources by reason of 'relevant measures', i.e. measures that would be required to be taken in order to ensure that the legal limit on class sizes of one teacher per 30 children is met at the school. Any appeals for places at the school are therefore 'infant class size prejudice cases'.

As Ashley Down Primary School was oversubscribed, the criteria stated in the booklet 'A Guide for parents and carers on applying for a primary school place for the school year 2019-2020' have been applied to allocate the places that are available at the school.

**199** on-time applications ( $63 \times 1^{st}$  preferences,  $83 \times 2^{nd}$  preferences,  $53 \times 3^{rd}$  preferences) have been received for Ashley Down Primary School, which has an Admission Number of **60**.

#### How the Initial Allocation of Places was made

The **60** places have been offered to the following children:

- 1. Those children who are defined as 'Children in Care'; or children who were previously in care, but immediately after being in care became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order. (**0** places).
- 2. Those children with siblings already at Ashley Down Primary School who will still be on roll in September 2019. (23 places)
- 3. Those children living closest to Ashley Down Primary School as measured in a direct line from the home address to the school (37 places)

The furthest distance offered a place in this category was **551 meters**.

#### **BEACON RISE PRIMARY SCHOOL - SEPTEMBER 2019**

As Beacon Rise Primary School was over-subscribed, it was necessary to use South Gloucestershire Council's admission criteria, as published in 'Admission to Primary Schools in South Gloucestershire September 2019 – August 2020', to allocate the places available at the school.

287 applications were received by the 15 January 2019 for Beacon Rise Primary School which has an admission number of 90.

#### How the initial allocation of places was made:

- 1 place was required for a child with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHC Plan).
- 3 Children in Public Care and Previously in Public Care
- 50 Local Siblings (within the Area of Prime Responsibility (APR)).
- 36 Children who live within the APR: The furthest distance offered a place under this criterion was 0.373 mile.

A total of 71 refusals have been made. Please note that some applications may have been either withdrawn by the parents/carers, or discounted where a higher preference of school has been offered.

Distances from home to school are measured in a direct line between the address point of the child's home and a central point within the main school buildings using the Local Authority's computerised mapping system.

#### Can I remain on a waiting list for my preferred school(s)?

Yes. The waiting lists will be maintained until the end of Term 2 (December).

#### **CLASS SIZE PREJUDICE APPEALS – Effects of Infant Class Size Legislation:**

Appeals for Beacon Rise Primary School will be heard on the basis of Infant Class Size Prejudice as the school will organise with three Reception classes each containing 30 pupils with one full-time qualified teacher (or the equivalent of) in each class.

**INFANT CLASS SIZE** – Government legislation means that infant classes (Reception, Year 1 and Year 2) with one teacher cannot contain more than 30 pupils.

At Infant Class Size Appeals the independent appeal panel can only look at:

- Whether the admission arrangements were lawful
- Whether the admission arrangements were incorrectly applied and your child should have been offered a place.
- Whether it was unreasonable/perverse (in law) to refuse your preference. The appeal panel would need to be satisfied that the decision was so completely absurd / outrageous that no reasonable person, with the same facts, would have made that decision.

Given the extremely limited grounds on which an appeal may be upheld, Infant Class Size Appeals are rarely successful. Since the legislation was introduced from September 2001, only 7 such appeals have been successful within South Gloucestershire.

Parents/carers can find it frustrating when they realise how very limited the powers of the Appeal Panel are. We are therefore drawing this to your attention now, so you can make an informed choice about whether you wish to appeal or not. The purpose of this information is to explain clearly the role of the Appeal Panel and not in any way discourage you from appealing, which is of course, your legal right if you feel you have grounds to do so.

As Bishop Road Primary School was oversubscribed, the criteria stated in the booklet 'A Guide for parents and carers on applying for a primary school place for the school year 2019-2020' have been applied to allocate the places that are available at the school.

**322** on-time applications (144 x 1<sup>st</sup> preferences, 83 x 2<sup>nd</sup> preferences, 95 x 3<sup>rd</sup> preferences) have been received for Bishop Road Primary School, which has an Admission Number of **120**.

The **30** places have been offered to the following children:

- 2. Those children with siblings already at Cabot Primary School who will still be on roll in September 2019. (21 places)
- 3. Those children living closest to Cabot Primary School as measured in a direct line from the home address to the school. (9 places)

#### **ALLOCATION STATEMENT FOR ENTRY TO RECEPTION 2019**

Cathedral Primary School (CPS) is a Free School run independently from the local authority (LA) and is funded directly by the Department for Education (DfE) for a set number of places in each year group (this is called the published admission number or PAN).

The PAN for Reception 2019 entry is 60.

#### Why has my child been unsuccessful in gaining a place at the school?

CPS has received **291** on-time applications for the **60** places available and is therefore unable to offer places to every applicant who applied.

#### How have the 60 places been allocated for Reception September 2019?

The Special Educational Needs team at Bristol City Council have not requested any places are reserved for children with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

Therefore, the 60 places have been allocated by applying the oversubscription criteria, **in order of priority**, as set out in the published admission arrangements 2019/20 for the 1<sup>st</sup> round of allocation:

- 'Looked after' children or 'previously looked after' children 1 place
- Siblings 32 places.
- Son/daughter of CPS member of staff none.
- Random allocation 27 places.

# APPEAL GUIDANCE FOR ADMISSION TO RECEPTION 2019 INFANT CLASS SIZE APPEAL

#### BEFORE COMPLETING AN APPEAL FORM PLEASE READ ALL PAGES IN THIS DOCUMENT

'Under the Education Act a parent/carer has the right to appeal against the decision to refuse their child a place at a school for which they have applied for.'

As a parent/carer you are able to express a preference to your home local authority regarding the school you would like your child to attend. If, however, the year group applied for is oversubscribed and has reached its published admission number (PAN) the admission authority may not be able to meet your preference. As a result, compliance with your preference would "prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources" at the school.

Cathedral Primary School (CPS), as its own admission authority received **291** on time applications for the reception class in September which has a published admission number of **60**.

All 60 places available have been offered in line with the oversubscription criteria, in order of priority, as set out in the CPS admission arrangements 2019/20. A copy of these arrangements are available on the CPS website <a href="http://www.cathedralprimaryschool.org/">http://www.cathedralprimaryschool.org/</a> to remind you of the procedure that has been followed.

Infant Class Size By law, all classes in which the majority of children will reach the age of 5, 6 or 7 during the school year (infant classes) can only have a maximum of 30 pupils. Where that limit is exceeded, schools are obliged to reduce that number by taking certain measures, such as employing an extra teacher or providing an extra classroom. Where these measures would cause prejudice to efficient education or the efficient use of resources, the admission authority can refuse to allocate any more places at the school (Infant Class Size Prejudice).

Please be aware there are **very limited** circumstances in which an infant class size appeal can be upheld. The information in this document will allow you to make an informed decision about whether to submit an appeal or not. Where a child has been refused admission on this basis, an Appeal Panel can only offer a place to a child if it is satisfied that either:

- the admission of additional children would not breach the infant class size limit; or
- that the decision to refuse admission on the ground of the infant class size limit was not

one which a reasonable admission authority would have made in the circumstances of the case; or

• that the child would have been offered a place if the admission arrangements had been properly implemented or the arrangements had not been contrary to the mandatory provisions in the School Admission Code and the School Standards and Framework Act 1998

How do I appeal for a place at CPS? If you decide to appeal you will need to complete the CPS appeal form with your reasons, in writing, why you wish to appeal for your child. This form is available from the school website or by requesting one from Admissions at the school. You will need to submit the appeal form to the school by Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May 2019. You may include any additional information which you feel is relevant to your appeal and return it to: Admissions, Cathedral Schools Trust, College Square, Bristol, BS1 5TS.

How does the appeal process work? Democratic Services at Bristol City Council is employed by CPS to administer and conduct school appeals on our behalf. They will organise an independent appeal panel which consists of 3 people with no prior connection with CPS, a Lay person, a Chair and a member acquainted with education. There will also be a clerk in attendance to minute the appeal.

The independent appeal panel must follow a two stage decision making process for all appeals.

**Stage 1 -** You will be invited to attend, which will be in the presence of all those appealing for a place for Reception. A presenting officer from the school will present the school's case and its decision not to admit the child. The panel will examine the decision by the school to refuse admission, whether the admission arrangements were correctly and impartially applied and whether the admission of an additional child would prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources.

**Stage 2 -** This is your individual appeal which will be held in private. The appeal panel must balance the prejudice to the school against your case for your child to be admitted. They will need to take into account your reasons for expressing a preference including what this school can offer your child that the allocated school or other schools cannot.

What happens once the appeal has been lodged with the school? CPS will acknowledge receipt of your appeal paperwork by letter or email and will forward all your appeal documents to Democratic Services.

When will the appeal be heard? The reception appeals for CPS are scheduled for **Tuesday 9th July 2019**. You will receive notification in writing from Democratic Services 10 days prior to the appeal hearing with a date and time for you to attend.

Where will the appeal be held? Appeals for CPS will be heard in Bristol City Council's City Hall, College Green, Bristol BS1 5UY.

Who decides the outcome of the appeal? The independent appeal panel must either uphold or dismiss an appeal. A panel's decision that a child shall be admitted is binding on the school and the parents. If your appeal is successful then a place will be offered at the school immediately. As a result successful appeals will take the school over its PAN. If your appeal is unsuccessful then your child will remain on the waiting list.

When do we know the result of the appeal? Parent/carers will be notified of a decision by Democratic Services once all the reception appeals have been heard.

What happens about the school place I've already been offered? If you appeal, the place you have been offered at another school will be reserved by your home local authority pending the outcome of the appeal for CPS.

What if I change my mind about appealing? If, at any time, you want to withdraw your appeal or remove your child's name from the waiting list, please inform Admissions at CPS and Democratic Services immediately.

What if I do not attend my appeal hearing? Where an appellant fails, or is unable, to attend and it is impractical to offer an alternative date the appeal may go ahead in your absence and a decision reached based on the written information submitted.

What if a place becomes available from the waiting list? If your child qualifies for a place that has subsequently become available at CPS whilst you are waiting for your appeal to be heard then in this event your appeal will be cancelled. N.B using your right to appeal will not affect your child being on the waiting list.

How are places allocated during the 2nd round allocation from the waiting list? CPS is its own admission authority and maintains its own waiting list. The waiting list will consist of applicants who have requested to be put on the waiting list, those who lodge an appeal, or late applications received after the national closing date for primary applications on 15th January 2019.

The waiting list will be ranked in line with the oversubscription criteria, in order of priority. Any late applicants who are 'looked after' or 'previously looked after' will be considered higher priority than any on time applications. A second round sibling applicant will get next priority at this stage. Where a place becomes available and there is no higher priority applicant to allocate as above, we will reoffer a place by carrying out a fresh round of random allocation of all remaining applicants on the waiting list.

# ADMISSION TO INFANT/PRIMARY SCHOOL INITIAL ALLOCATION STATEMENT FOR ON-TIME APPLICATIONS CHARBOROUGH ROAD PRIMARY SCHOOL - SEPTEMBER 2019

As Charborough Road Primary School was over-subscribed, it was necessary to use the Olympus Academy Trust criteria, as published in 'Admission to Primary Schools in South Gloucestershire September 2019 – August 2020', to allocate the places available at the school.

95 applications were received by the 15 January 2019 for Charborough Road Primary School which has an Admission Number of 30. The Admission Level includes placements at the Special Resource Base for Speech and Language Difficulties.

#### How the initial allocation of places was made:

1 place was required for a child with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHC Plan)

11 Local Siblings (within the Area of Prime Responsibility (APR)).

18 Children who live within the APR: the furthest distance offered a place under this criterion was 0.41 mile.

Although Charborough Road Primary School was filled as detailed above, 1 further place was required for a child to attend the Special Educational Needs Resource Base, as a permitted exception to the infant class size limit, which resulted in a total of 31 offers being made.

A total of 21 refusals have been made. Please note that some applications may have been either withdrawn by the parents/carers, or discounted where a higher preference of school has been offered.

Distances from home to school are measured in a direct line between the address point of the child's home and a central point within the main school buildings using the Local Authority's computerised mapping system.

#### Can I remain on a waiting list for my preferred school(s)?

Yes. You can remain on the waiting list for as long as you like.

#### Can I appeal the decision not to offer my child a place at the school?

Yes, all parents/carers whose child has been refused admission to a school may exercise their right of appeal. However, if the school has a full Reception class containing 30 pupils any appeals will be heard on Infant Class Size Prejudice.

Infant Class Size legislation states that classes where the majority of children will reach the age of 5, 6 or 7 during the school year must not contain more than 30 pupils with a single teacher.

#### **Infant Class Size Appeals**

Statutory limits on class sizes mean that infant classes with a single qualified teacher cannot contain more than 30 pupils without taking 'qualifying measures' to comply with the statutory duty to limit infant classes with a single teacher to a maximum of 30. Qualifying measures include those such as

- employing an additional teacher
- building an extra classroom
- reorganisation of classes

The infant classes at St Bernadette Catholic Primary School are organised with a maximum of 30 in each year group, so appeals for the infant classes will be heard on the basis of 'class size prejudice'.

### Allocation Statement for St Mary Redcliffe C of EVC Primary School - September 2019

As St Mary Redcliffe C of E VC Primary School was oversubscribed, the criteria stated in 'A guide for parents and carers on applying for a primary school place for the school year 2019 – 2020' have been applied to allocate the places that are available at the school.

**140** on-time applications (68 x  $1^{st}$  preferences, 35 x  $2^{nd}$  preferences, 37 x  $3^{rd}$  preferences have been received for St Mary Redcliffe C of E VC Primary School, which has an Admission Number of 60.

### How the Initial Allocation of Places was made

The **60** places have been offered to the following children:

- 1. Children in the care of the Local Authority or who were previously in Care but immediately after being in Care became subject to an adoption order, child arrangement order or special guardianship order. (2 places)
- 2. Those children with siblings already at St Mary Redcliffe C of E VC Primary School and who will still be there in September 2019. (28 places)
- 3. Those children living closest to St Mary Redcliffe C of E VC Primary School as measured in a direct line from the home address to the Academy. (**30** places) The furthest distance offered a place in this category was **0.599 km**.

### **CLASS SIZE PREJUDICE APPEALS - Effects of Infant Class Size Legislation.**

Appeals for St Mary Redcliffe C of E VC Primary School will be heard on the basis of Class Size Prejudice as the Academy will have two Reception classes each containing 30 pupils.

### Place Allocation Statement for St Patrick's Catholic Primary School

### September 2019 Intake

St Patrick's Catholic Primary School serves the Catholic parish of St Patrick's. It was built by parishioners and opened in 1933. Accordingly, the school is very much part of the parish community. The school is an academy which has been granted Catholic religious designation and is funded by the Department of Education (via the Education Funding Agency).

The parish of St Patrick's is defined by parish boundaries. A map showing the parish boundaries can be accessed on the school's website, or in hard copy from the school's office.

### Why has my child not been offered a place at St Patrick's Catholic Primary School?

The school's published admission number ("PAN") for Reception Year for the September 2019 intake is 30 pupils. This is based on the number and size of the buildings contained on the school's site, and is also influenced by the statutory maximum infant class size of 30, which applies to Reception, Year 1 and Year 2.

When more applications for admission are received for more children than there are places available, the order in which the available places are allocated is determined by reference to the oversubscription criteria set out in the school's Admission Policy for the September 2019 intake, which is published on the school's website and replicated in the local authority's prospectus for all schools and academies in its area.

St Patrick's Catholic Primary School received applications for the admission of 102 children to Reception Year in September 2019 on or before the closing date for applications which was on 15<sup>th</sup> January 2019. This represents 72 more applications than there are places available in that year group. A total of 45 applications were from Baptised Catholic Children. This represents an unusually high proportion of applications and is the reason why applications from the highest oversubscription bands were still unable to be offered a place.

All of our offered places were first choice applications.

### Application of the Oversubscription Criteria for the September 2019 Intake

As the school was oversubscribed, the school's oversubscription criteria set out in the Admission Policy for the September 2019 intake were applied to determine the order in which places were allocated (i.e. to determine which of the 102 children were offered the 30 available places).

This means that the 30 available places were exhausted at category 4.1 (baptised Catholic children living

within the parish boundary), and the tie breaker was used to determine which of these 31 children were allocated the remaining 16 places. The tie breaker was random allocation, as set out in the school's Admission Policy for the September 2019 intake.

This allocation statement only reflects the applications where St Patrick's Catholic Primary School was the highest ranked choice school of the parent.

### **Waiting List**

The names of all children who were not offered a place will be maintained by the school until 31st December 2019, after which time the waiting list will be cleared. The waiting list is ranked strictly in accordance with the oversubscription criteria set out in the school's Admission Policy.

### **Admission Appeals**

All parents have a statutory right to appeal against a decision to refuse their child a place at a school to which they have applied for admission.

The deadline for submitting a request for an appeal is <u>24<sup>th</sup> May 2019</u>, and the procedure to be followed (including the form which must be used) is set out in the Appeals Procedure Booklet, which is published on the school's website.

If you do decide to appeal, your will need to consider the strength of your grounds of appeal, and the reasons why you feel that St. Patrick's Catholic Primary School is the only school you believe can meet your child's needs. You should carefully prepare your case, including well-reasoned grounds of appeal, and provide supporting evidence wherever possible.

Examples of grounds which will not be met with success are that your child's friend will be attending the school, or that the school is the nearest of several local schools.

An appeal panel may only uphold your appeal where:

- The admissions arrangements did not comply with the mandatory requirements of admission law; or
- The admission arrangements were incorrectly or impartially applied in your child's case; or
- The decision to refuse a place was not one which a reasonable admission authority would make in the circumstances of your case.

The School Admission Appeals Code 2012 defines an unreasonable decision as one which is "perverse in the light of the admission arrangements", namely that it was "beyond the range of responses open to a reasonable decision maker" or "a decision which is so outrageous in its defiance of logic or of accepted moral standards that no sensible person who had applied his mind to the question could have arrived at it". This is a high threshold to meet.

### **RECEPTION ADMISSION 2019/2020 APPEALS PROCEDURE**

### BEFORE COMPLETING AN APPEAL FORM PLEASE READ ALL PAGES IN THIS BOOKLET

'Under the Education Act a parent/carer has the right to appeal against the decision to refuse a child a place at a school for which they have applied for.'

As a parent/carer you are able to express a preference to your local home authority regarding the school you would like your child to attend. If, however, the Year Group applied for is oversubscribed and has reached its Published Admission Number (PAN) the admission authority may not be able to meet your preference. As a result, compliance with your preferred school would "prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources" at the school.

St Patrick's Catholic Primary School, as its own admission authority received 102 on time applications for the reception class for the academic year 2019/2020 which has a PAN of 30.

### How do I appeal for a place at St Patrick's Catholic Primary School?

Please ensure that you have received the official paperwork from your local authority which gives the reason why your child's application has been unsuccessful and the statement as to how the 30 places have been allocated at St Patrick's Catholic Primary School.

If you decide to appeal you will need to complete the St Patrick's Catholic Primary School Appeal Form with your reasons, in writing, based on the published oversubscription criteria.

This form is available from the school's website or from the School Office. You will need to submit this appeal form to the school by the deadline of **24th May 2019**. You may need to include any additional information which you feel is relevant to your appeal with this form and return it to: Clerk to the Admissions Committee, St Patrick's School, Blackswarth Road, Redfield, Bristol BS5 8AS.









### How does the Appeal process work?

Appeals for Catholic schools in the Diocese of Clifton are heard by a panel of 3 people, appointed by the Diocese. There will also be a clerk to minute the appeal.

### The process is as follows:

**Stage 1** - You will be invited to attend, which will be in the presence of all those appealing for a place in Reception. A presenting officer from the school will outline why the child was not offered a place at the school. The panel will examine the decision by the school to not offer the place, will look at whether the schools decision were correctly and impartially applied and whether the admission of an additional child would prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources.

**Stage 2** – This is your individual appeal which will be held in private. The appeal panel must balance the prejudice to the school against your case for your child to be admitted. They will need to take into account your reasons for expressing a preference including what this school can offer your child that the allocated school or other schools cannot.

### What happens once the appeal has been lodged by the school?

St Patrick's Catholic Primary will acknowledge receipt to your appeal paperwork and will forward all your appeal documents to the Diocese of Clifton.

### When will the appeal be heard?

The reception appeals for St Patrick's Catholic Primary are provisionally scheduled to start in July 2019.

### Where will the appeal be heard?

The appeal is held at the Clifton Diocese Office at: Alexander House, 160 Pennywell Road, Bristol BS5 OTX.

### Who decides the outcome of the appeal?

The appeal panel must either uphold or dismiss the appeal. A panel's decision is final and binding on the school and the parents. If upheld, your child will be admitted to the school and will take the school over its PAN. If your appeal is unsuccessful you will remain on the waiting list.

### When do we know the result of the appeal?

Parents/carers will be notified once all the reception appeals have been heard.

### What happens about the school place I've already been offered?

If you appeal, the place you have been offered at another school will be reserved by your local authority pending the outcome of your appeal.

### What if I change my mind about appealing?

If, at any time, you want to withdraw your appeal or remove your child's name from the waiting list, please inform the Clerk to the Admissions Committee at St Patricks Catholic Primary immediately.

### What if I do not attend my appeal hearing?

Where an appellant fails, or is unable, to attend and it is impractical to offer an alternative date, the appeal may go ahead in your absence and a decision reached based upon the written information submitted.

#### Please note:

There is a financial cost to the school for each appeal lodged. This has to be paid regardless of whether an appeal is withdrawn or the appeal hearing is not attended by the parent.

### How are places allocated during the second round of allocations from the waiting list?

St Patricks Catholic Primary is its own admission authority and maintains its own waiting list. The waiting list will consist of applicants who were unsuccessful in the first round of allocations and wish to be put on our waiting list, those who lodge an appeal or late applications received after the deadline of 15<sup>th</sup> January 2019.

The waiting list is ranked in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. An application which has provided proof of Catholic Baptism will rank higher than an application which has not provided this proof of Catholic Baptism. It is very important to contact the school and provide evidence of Catholic Baptism if you have not already done so.

An application without this evidence provided by the deadline on 15<sup>th</sup> January 2019 will otherwise be ranked as Category 7 - All other children as a Non-Catholic and as such will have a lower ranking in the second round of allocation.

**Please note;** if this has happened, we will immediately re-rank your application upon receiving the Catholic Baptism certificate and enter it into the second round of applications as a higher ranking. **However:** We will **not** be able to offer a place *even if you would have gained a place in the first round of applications* unless the evidence of Catholic Baptism was held by the school at the deadline of 15<sup>th</sup> January 2019. You should also note that not *all* Catholic Applications are successful in the first round of allocations as the school may be oversubscribed in this category and random allocation may have been used to determine the offer of places as stated in our oversubscription policy.

We are therefore drawing this to your attention now, so you can make an informed choice about whether you wish to appeal or not. The purpose of this information is to explain clearly the role of the Appeal Panel and not in any way discourage you from appealing, which is of course, your legal right if you feel you have grounds to do so.

The distance between home and school for the last child offered a place was 3.437 miles.

To admit another child to the school would cause prejudice to the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources by reason of 'relevant measures', i.e. measures that would be required to be taken in order to ensure that the legal limit on class sizes of one teacher per 30 children is met at the school. Any appeals for places at the school are therefore 'infant class size prejudice cases'.
