## Mansion House and gardens walk



A 30 minute walk around the mansion and formal gardens



## 1: Coach House

This building originally housed the Smyth coaches, but until recently was also used to house the Lord Mayor's coach and horses. Bristol City Council was the last local authority to have a coach and horses for the Lord Mayor.

## 2: The Goram

Meet Goram – legend has it that to win the affections of Princess Avona, Goram dug the Henbury Gorge, but was overshadowed by his brother Vincent, who created the Avon Gorge.

## 3: Ice House

This building was used to store ice from the pond throughout the year before the invention of the refrigerator.

## 4: Rose Garden

Back in the Smyth's day this area used to be home to green houses, hot houses, and a mushroom house. 15 years ago, the rose garden you see today was built and maintained with the help of volunteers.

## 5: Sun Dial

Sun dials were used for decoration and to tell the time before the invention of the clock. If you stand in the centre your shadow will tell the time. The sun dial was gifted to Ashton Court Estate by the Bristol International Kite Festival.
