Comments received: We have given these comments consideration and provide responses below. Please note, we will only respond to comments that directly refer to the consultation.

Comments	Response
To make it a success the community should be involved	Yes absolutely. We would be very happy to welcome the community to the planting session.
Sometimes people drive their cars over the green space so young trees might easily get damaged	Thank you for your observation. We will take this into account when we mark up the planting locations.
The residents on Delabere Avenue, Hallbrow Crescent, Ettricke Drive and Dauberry Close should at the least be door knocked and consulted on the proposal	Consultation letters were sent to the residents on Delabere Avenue, Hallbrow Crescent, Ettricke Drive, Dauberry Close who will be directly affected by new tree planting. Posters were also placed around the site giving residents the opportunity to comment on the plans.
It would be good if we (local people) could influence the species and varieties of trees to be planted in a community orchard	We have a selection of apple, pear, plum trees that the community are welcome to choose from. We plant heritage fruit tree and therefore have a limited stocklist from our supplier.
It would be good that local people are involved in planting the trees so they have ownership of the changes and look after the trees.	Yes absolutely. We would be very happy to welcome the community to the planting session and future maintenance sessions.

<p>How will local people know this is a community orchard and come and take the fruit. Some kind of signage might help so people have permission</p>	<p>We are happy to welcome the local community to the planting session and future maintenance sessions. Posters can go up on site when the trees are mature enough for fruit to be picked.</p>
